

A **Comprehensive Plan** is a document that provides the **vision** for what a community **wants to become** and the steps that need to be taken to reach that vision. The plan provides **guidance and direction** to property owners, residents, elected and appointed officials, County staff, and local leaders who are responsible for **implementing desired changes** for the future of the community.



## **Vision**

- 2. Open Ended: What do you value most about living in Elbert County?
- 3. Rank what should be the County's top priorities when planning for the future:
  - Expanding housing and infrastructure to support growth
  - Protecting open space, farmland, and natural resources
  - · Enhancing public services and community well-being
  - Promoting economic development and job creation
  - Preserving the County's unique identity and heritage

# 1. Multiple Choice: How should the County balance growth while preserving its character?

- Prioritize economic development and housing, even if it changes the community's look and feel.
- Focus on preserving historic and rural character, even if it limits growth opportunities.
- Encourage smart growth strategies that guide development to specific areas while protecting open space and heritage.
- Promote community-driven design standards that ensure new development reflects local character.
- Balance growth and preservation through incentives for sustainable and context-sensitive development.



- 2. Multiple Choice: What should be the County's primary goal for land use and development?
  - Preserve rural and agricultural land
  - Expand suburban and low-density housing options
  - Preserve agricultural lands and rural landscapes while allowing limited growth in designated areas
  - Support growth in towns to strengthen local economies and services

  - Upgrade and maintain essential infrastructure (roads, bridges, water, and sewer) in rural and underserved areas
  - Invest in transportation improvements that connect towns and support regional mobility
  - Expand broadband and utility access to support economic development and quality of life
  - Prioritize capital projects that enhance public safety, emergency services, and community resilience
  - Develop a long-term capital improvement strategy that balances growth, equity, and fiscal responsibility
